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Oregon has plenty of mountains that hikers in fit condition can tackle with a good pair of boots, solid navigational skills and some determination.

Keep reading to find out where to go and how to explore Oregon's peaks safely.



With unforgettable views of the Three Sisters Wilderness and the Cascades, the Climber's Trail at SOUTH SISTER is an icon in Central Oregon. Be sure to stay on designated trails and respect wildlife.

Location: Three Sisters Wilderness, near Bend Elevation: 10,358 feet Length: 11.6 miles Best time to visit: June through October * Permit Required



DID YOU KNOW that Oregon has its own Swiss Alps-like Matterhorn, where you can see local mountain goats and the beautiful Ice Lake?

Location: Eagle Cap Wilderness, near Joseph Elevation: 9,826 feet Length: 19 miles round-trip Best time to visit: May through September * Permit Required



Many of Oregon's high-alpine trails are deep in the backcountry where cell service is limited.

HERE ARE SOME TIPS on how to be prepared:

- Bring a map, do research and obtain the proper permits well in advance. Park in designated parking spots only.
- Get an early start and visit midweek when possible. Know your limits and check conditions before you go.
- Ø • Be sure to bring your Ten Essentials including plenty of food and water, sunscreen, a rain jacket, sturdy footwear, trekking poles, paper trail map and first-aid supplies.



Oregon's Top COASTAL OVERLOOKS



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traveloregon Take in the views of Oregon's spectacular coastline at one of many historic lighthouses. Swipe to learn more about where to see wildlife, find perfect picnic locations, and how to visit responsibly.

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Oregon is famous for its abundance of water and **363** miles of rugged coastline. Eleven easily accessible capes showcase scenic views ideal for picnics, photography, storm watching and catching a sunset.




Coastal overlooks offer incredible views of local wildlife like seabirds, sea lions, seal pups and migrating gray whales.

The highest viewpoint accessible by car is Cape Perpetua Overlook Day Use Area, where up to **70 MILES** of coastline is visible on a clear day.

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Whenever visiting these special coastal areas, be sure to keep your distance from wildlife, stay in designated areas far from the edge and heed all safety signage.

Only park in designated areas and pack out all trash, to **PROTECT LOCAL ECOLOGY** and leave these places beautiful for generations to come.





Some of Oregon's capes are great places to spot or explore nearby lighthouses.

Here are several to check out:

- CAPE BLANCO LIGHTHOUSE the oldest lighthouse in Oregon, with guided tours available
- TILLAMOOK ROCK LIGHTHOUSE aka Terrible Tilly (visible at Arch Cape)
- YAQUINA HEAD LIGHTHOUSE
 with Interpretive Center, tide pools
 and hiking trails available
- HECETA HEAD LIGHTHOUSE with a sheltered beach, hiking trails and guided lighthouse program

Here are some top activities in this 1.7-million-acre forest:

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• Learn about the Humongous Fungus, a mostly underground fungal mass that is believed to be the largest living organism on Earth. (Know that the fungus is mostly hidden from view and its mushrooms pop up for only a short time.)

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
• Wander through the 26-acre Cedar Grove Botanical Area.

 Camp at the picturesque Delintment Lake Campground, where visitors can fish, hike, and boat on non-motorized watercraft.



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Summer: 250 miles of trails for hiking, including the idyllic Strawberry Lakes Trail.





Winter: Cross-country skiing, snowshoeing, and snowmobiling are popular activities but note that Forest Service roads are not plowed.

Spring: Campgrounds and cabin rentals re-open and there are lots

of trails ideal for biking.

Plan Ahead 🎊

- Cell service is limited, so consult paper maps and check in with a nearby ranger district office.
- Check road and trail conditions prior to departure. Park in designated parking spots only.
- Be mindful of your surroundings, follow Leave No Trace standards, and make wildfire prevention a priority.



Hiking and Permitting for

OREGON'S CENTRAL CASCADES



Hikers are required to secure a **CENTRAL CASCADES WILDERNESS PERMIT** for some of these popular trails in an effort to secure the protection of these landscapes now and into the future, in accordance with the Wilderness Act of 1964.

- Permits are required June 15 Oct. 15, 2022 for overnight visits, as well as for day-use visits to 19 of the area's 79 trails.
- Day-use permits are available at *Recreation.gov* on a rolling basis, 10 days and then two days before the day of a trip.
- Most trails in the area do not require a Central Cascades Wilderness Permit, so do your research to see what's open and accessible.
